

As of the Easter weekend, the process of watering-up the Keeyask project was completed.

This involved allowing water back into the areas which were being maintained dry for construction. Following that, lowering & removing the North Channel Cofferdam allowed for re-connection of the Nelson River to the previous dry intake work area. Over the full process, upstream cofferdams, rock groins, and haul roads were lowered or

removed. Also, water was pumped into the downstream tailrace area to fill it up, and its cofferdam is being removed. At the end of the process, the tailrace and intake areas now match the current levels of the Nelson River around the project site.

Tyler Anseeuw, Lead of Manitoba Hydro Earthworks, said that the greatest challenge for water-up was having all aspects of the work ready to go at the same time. "Having the powerhouse concrete structure & finishing complete, electrical & mechanical systems ready to handle seepage water, portions of the turbines & generators complete, and all earthworks structures ready to hold back the rising water."



"The added challenge was completing all the final earthwork removals and preparing the Powerhouse complex in freezing conditions."
